Meeting of the City Commission of the City of Farmington was held on March 8, 1950.
 Meeting was called to order by Mayor Hamlin at 8:30 p.m.
 Commissioners Present: Hutton, Loomis, Miller and Cavanaugh.
 Motion made by Commissioner Loomis and supported by Commissioner Hutton that the following Ordinance No. C29-50 be adopted and become effective immediately:
 The City of Farmington Ordinance:
 Section 1. In the year 1950 and each year thereafter, the first day of January shall be the tax day in the City of Farmington for all day and personal property. The taxing status of persons and of real and personal property shall be determined as of the tax day above stated.
 Section 2. In the year 1950 and each year thereafter the City Assessor shall on or before the first day of March make and complete the assessment roll.
 Section 3. On the Tuesday next following the first Monday in March of each year the Board of Review shall meet for the purposes of reviewing and correcting the assessment roll at the Municipal Building of the City of Farmington in the City of Farmington and shall remain in session between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. and 5 p.m. and shall remain in session and continue in session that day and the next day between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. under the provisions of the General Tax Law of the State of Michigan. The provisions of Section 142 of Chapter XVIII of the Charter of the City of Farmington shall remain in full force and effect except as herein modified and except as amended by the General Tax Law of the State of Michigan. The review of assessments shall be completed on or before the first Monday in April of each year.
 Section 4. This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the provisions of "The General Property Tax Act" as last amended by Act 285 of the Public Acts of 1949, which amendment authorizes the foregoing changes in the making, completing and reviewing of the assessment roll, any provisions of the City Charter notwithstanding.
 Section 5. This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency ordinance and shall become immediately effective upon its introduction and passage without the necessity of publication or the posting of notices.
