Dairy Workers Organize Union

Employees of the Farmington Dairy voted Tuesday to organize themselves into a union. By a 121 vote, the election held by the State Mediation Board converted Farmington Dairy employees to Local 32 of the United Dairy Workers (CIO).

First steps toward organization of the shop came several weeks ago when pickets surrounded the dairy plant. Tony Himmelman, vice president of the concern, said that paid vacations will be about the only change in working conditions. He added that gains on this score would be offset by other working changes to make little to total difference.

Contract negotiations are now in progress, and the working agreement is to be signed in the near future.

According to J. A. Mitchell, veteran fire research expert of the U.S. Forest Service, it was predicted a year ago that 1949-50 would be the most hazardous years in the Great Lakes area since 1933, for brush and forest fires. Grass fires in the Farmington area were extremely high last year. During one three day period in March last year the Farmington Fire Department made 21 grass fire calls. Persons are being warned prior to the dry spring season in an effort to reduce the expected large number of grass fire calls.

Editor - "Sincerely Yours":
I find it necessary to clarify my position with regard to the action taken recently by the Farmington Township Schools Board of Education in the matter of providing a lighted athletic field for football.

I do not favor the action for the following reasons:

1. The lights are not for an existing field.
2. The location of the proposed field is too far from adequate light house facilities.
3. It is planned to equip the field with lights suitable only for football (and possibly track) which presently schedules not over six (6) home games a season.
4. The tax revenue expected is not enough to do a right job of equipping properly even such a project.
5. The proposed location could not be adequately protected from vandalism.
6. Estimates of cost have not been clearly defined.
7. The whole plan is too loosely prepared.
8. The costs of a special election are not warranted. (This matter should be placed on the ballot at the annual election.)
9. In the face of these facts and the educational needs of the school system for more facilities and equipment of absolute essential character to provide for the rapidly increasing school population I cannot find it reasonable to spend public monies on this project, as proposed.

Therefore I wish it known that in the Roll-call vote taken in the February Board meeting I voted NO!

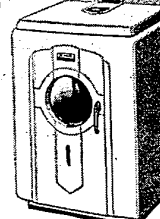
Grace Church Chli Supper March 28

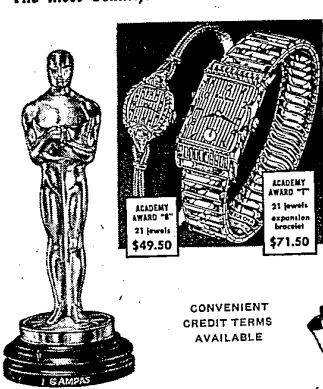
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
