Mid-Year Degrees

A total of 583 Michigan State
College students will complete re-
quirements for undergraduate and
advanced degrees at the end of
the winter term March 21.

Seventy three of these students
are eligible for advanced degrees
and 510 for bachelor's degrees, ac-
cording to Robert S. Linton, regis-
trar.

Winter graduates were honored
at informal ceremonies March 7 in
the MSC Union, at which Dr. Lee
M. Thurston, state superintendent
of public instruction, was the prin-
cipal speaker. Diplomats were not
awarded at the ceremonies, but
graduates will be invited to partici-
pate in June commencement exer-
