A period of chaos would be certain, military planners fear, unless careful plans are made now for an alternate capital, with microfilm records stored there.

Speculation is that an alternate capital would be safest somewhere in the Rockies, possibly Denver or Salt Lake City.

JOHN L. LEWIS' JUDGE

Federal Judge Richmond Byrne, the man who had been slapping John L. Lewis with those back-to-work court orders, was teetotal on law enforcement. His father was a District of Columbia policeman.
