Muddy Roads (Continued from Page One) From Renssler to Angling was not served by the carriers; lack of sidewalks prevented city mounted carriers from delivering mail on foot. 1500 boxes were left unsorted Monday. In other places, mailmen left their cars to deliver the mail, walking through heavy mud most of the way. Where sidewalks were available, city carriers deserted the automobiles completely. Rural carriers found it necessary to dismount and wade up to their knees and go around a square mile to enter the street from the opposite direction.

SCHOOL BUSES REROUTED Superintendent O. E. Dunckel said Monday that although attendance was surprisingly good under the circumstances, school buses were not leaving paved roads. Students had to walk to either Grand River or 12 Mile Road Monday, because school buses weren't going over routes they normally traveled. Monday, school attendance was off 20% in the 7th and 8th grades, and 10% off in the high school. However, attendance figures were closer to normal Tuesday when the mud had partially dried up. Some schools were not attended so adversely affected, as most of the bus routes were on paved roads originally. Bus drivers were instructed not to use Angling Road unless definitely impassable and to discharge passengers for Edgewood School at Eight Mile Road, three blocks from the school. Using heroes of the mud deluge were milkmen and paper carriers who braved mud often knee deep to deliver their wares. Many of the carriers ended the day soaked to the skin and near exhaustion from wading through streets they normally drove over. Camels and pigs are said to be unable to swim.
