Miss Lillian Sager from Henry Ford Hospital, and Miss Marie Comas from Grace Hospital in Detroit assisted with the program by telling of the life led by the student nurses as they go through their training period.

Chairman of the dance is Lillian Panici.

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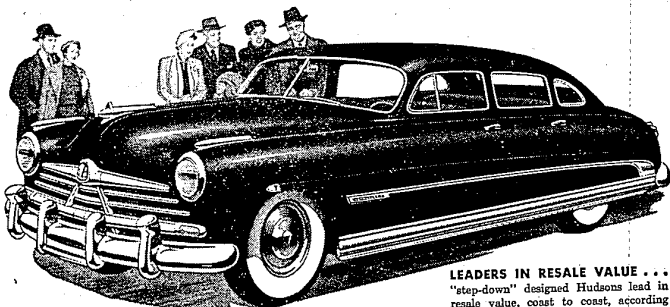
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
