To The Editor:

We again avail ourselves of your column to comment on several recent developments in the matter of the special election on the Building Code.

We note, with interest, that pressure was recently exerted on the Township Board to affirm its position favoring the Code and the Board finally agreed, although with apparent reluctance. This gesture can certainly not be regarded as sensational and the Board could not consistently reverse itself in view of the fact that it originally fathered the ordinance. Therefore, the action came as a surprise to no one.

Furthermore, it would appear that certain groups have the opinion that the Township Board represents only a segment of the residents of this community and should be concerned with their interests alone. We may be a little old-fashioned but we hold to the opinion that the Board is representative of all the people and, where an issue is to be decided by referendum, should not apply itself too vigorously to the support of either faction and the decision should finally rest with the people.

Unfortunately, we cannot expect sufficient space in your letter column to discuss the various features of the Code in detail. Obviously, several sections of the Code permit of such loose interpretation that, to limit to great misgivings regarding the desirability of the entire ordinance.

To illustrate one of the possibilities for trouble in the future in the event the ordinance is approved, we note that, according to the March 23rd issue of the Pontiac Daily Press, certain residents of Troy Township are having serious difficulty over the building code there. The Township is the defendant in a suit asking for a mandatory injunction in Oakland County Circuit Court. The plaintiff charges that, after first and second approvals had been granted, the Township changed inspectors and the new official revoked the second approval. Circuit Judge Frank L. Doty ordered the Township into

court on March 25 to show cause why the injunctions should not be granted.

Throughout this campaign we have heard frequent reference made to "the interests of the workman." We would like to explain that this term is very much "kicked around". Anyone giving services for hire can be placed in this category to be a laborer, clerk, supervisor, farmer or other classification. We all work for a living. We are mainly concerned with two groups. They are "Higher income bracket" and "Lower income bracket". Obviously the former will not be too badly worried over ordinary increases in taxation and can be expected to favor the Code. It is the person in the "Lower income bracket" who will be more seriously affected. This group, evidently in the majority in Farmington Township, will determine the issue in the forthcoming election.
