Burning woodlots, marsh lands and fence rows is about like burning money, Michigan State College specialists point out that both weeds the humus and birds and wild game need the cover.

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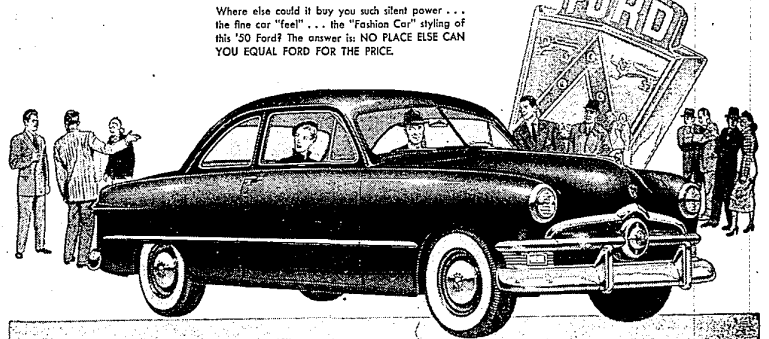
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
