code, indicate confidence that the proposition will be defeated at the polls. The group claims it would lead to incorporation or possible annexation and is "restrictive". In the last voting on an ordinance relating to land use and building construction, a proposed zoning ordinance was defeated 437 to 264.

CALL CODE "PROTECTION"
Proponents of the code call it "the real protection from loss of life and property by fire." Maintaining the code will help the man who builds his own house avoid mistakes. The Southeast group says the code will restrict "only the builder who is a gyp and a cheat and should be restricted."

Members of the Farmington Township Fire Department, long also expressed strong desire to see the code enacted. "We've been needing something like that for a long time," Fire Chief Leo Hendry says. However, the chief pointed out that nothing in the ordinance covers construction of chimneys and furnace installation. "And some of these companies considered legitimate don't do the job right," he added. However, Hendry admitted that the code would be a start toward an adequate code for fire protection.

Forest Fire Season Delayed This Year

While first spring forest or grass fires have yet to be recorded, conservation department fire fighters had battled 135 blazes which damaged 4,672 acres by the week ending April 3 last year.

Intermittent spring rain and some snow have at least delayed the fire season. And Michigan newspapers have been running special reminders on the spring danger season since March 30.

Over 75 per cent of the 1949 damage of 21,088 acres had occurred by April 30. Smokers and brush and debris burners were responsible for over 1,200 of last year's 1,624 fires.
