Dr. Harry Ironsides At Southfield Church

Dr. Harry A. Ironsides, Litt. D., will be speaking for five nights, beginning Sunday, April 16, at 7:30 p.m., at the Southfield Community Presbyterian Church, 21122 Indian Road, according to the Pastor, the Rev. H. Raymond Bayne. The church is located two miles west of Telegraph Road and 2 blocks north of Eight Mile Road.

Dean of American Gospel Preachers, and author of over 40 books on the Bible, Dr. Ironsides has been heard on both the American and European continents. For over 16 years he was pastor of the famous Moody Memorial Church in Chicago with a regular Sunday audience of some 4000 people. According to his biography "Ordained of the Lord", the offerings of his church would decrease as much as \$100 a Sunday whenever he was away from his pulpit. He is in constant demand in Bible Conferences all over America. This is his first visit to Detroit in several years, and he is already booked two years into the future.

In addition to the evening service, Dr. Ironsides will also be speaking Sunday morning at 10:00 and 11:15 a.m. He will also speak on Wednesday at 1:00 to the Women's Missionary Society at their Annual Spring Luncheon. Mrs. John Brown is president of this group.
