

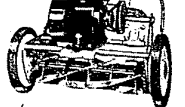

Bell Telephone Co.
Gives Girl Assembly

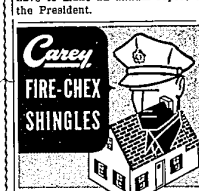
Wednesday, April 12, the Junior and senior girls were favored with a vocational assembly sponsored by the Michigan Bell Telephone Co. Two representatives explained to the girls some of the functions of a telephone operator. They are physical qualifications, stating a girl must be at least five feet tall, normal weight, eye sight, and hearing, and have a pleasant, distinct voice with no accent. As for education, a high school diploma or its equivalent is preferred including ability to perform simple math, to spell correctly, and to write legibly.

When first employed there is a two to five week training period, the length depending on the office where the operator will be placed. The pay usually begins at \$15 per week with full pay during the training period. The hours of work vary, and after a girl has accumulated enough seniority she may choose her own hours.

A movie on "Telephone Courtesy" was shown to try and help the students improve their telephone manners.

Superior, Erie Waters
Drop, Others Rise

Both Superior and Erie water levels went down in March while other Great Lakes continued to show gains, according to a U. S. Lake Survey report received by the conservation department.

Superior dropped .13 of a foot from the February reading. Erie measurements indicated a .02 of a foot decline.

Levels moved upward .03 of a foot in Lakes Michigan and Huron, and .31 of a foot in Ontario.

OF GRASS SEED
