Finish Experimental Weir This Month

The conservation department's experimental weir at the Au Gres river near National City, designed to hold back migrant Lake Huron rainbows, will be finished not later than the last week of April.

Spring floods have continued to hinder construction. Weir is three-quarters finished and tabbed for operation before the opening of trout season. Main spawning runs usually occur in northern lower peninsula streams from late April to early May.

First planned over two years ago by the department's fish division, the weir is expected to hold back large migrant rainbows, making them available to fishermen in season. Usually, after the spring spawning run upstream, many rainbows return to the Great Lakes and are lost to sport fishing.

The test weir is so designed to permit normal fish movement during the rest of the year.

A department crew of fisheries and engineering specialists are supervising a proposed upstream siting below M-55. Objective is to determine the merits of a sportsman's proposal that the department construct a dam to provide a pond. Such an impoundment would serve the same purpose as the weir, Land adjoining the weir is State-owned while that in the proposed pond area is not.

The Guiley pond, further upstream, again will be available to rainbows anglers this coming season.

GOOD CROPS RESULT FROM SINGLE TRIP TO PLOW AND PLANT

"Once over" soil preparation that eliminates extra tillage steps, can help cut down seeded preparation costs and still maintain crop yields, advise Michigan State College soil scientists.

R. L. Cook, soil scientist at MSC, cites tests conducted at the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station. They show that plowing, light tilling, and planting in a single operation, produced as high yields of small grains on soil of good tilth as did conventional seed-bed preparation that included double disking and spike-tooth harrowing.

The once-over method also permitted quicker planting and a saving in motor fuel. Two disking and two harrowing operations were eliminated. Another advantage was that the soil had greater water storage capacity, for tilth was not broken down by excessive tillage.

The MSC scientists say that keeping the soil in good tilth is needed for crop production. Loose, grainy soils give a good contact between the soil and the seed, making it easier for roots to reach plant nutrients, water and air.

Good tilth is a product of good rotation, not repeated workings with machinery, they say. Every time you go over a field with a tractor or heavy equipment, the weight and action of the machinery grinds up soil particles and damages soil structure. It cuts down the soil's water-absorbing capacity. Roots have a harder time getting nutrients and moisture.

Tilth and structure can be built up and maintained if the soil is steadily supplied with organic matter. The best source of organic matter is well-fertilized grass mixtures grown regularly in the rotation. Crop residues and manure help, but they alone cannot do the whole job of maintaining tilth.

Legume grass crops need plenty of fertilizer carrying phosphate and potash.

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Forest Fire Season Lags

No forest fires but seven first-class grass fires were extinguished by conservation department firemen in the week ending April 9.

Five blazes were in the northern lower peninsula and two in southern Michigan. Fifteen acres were blackened.

By the week ending April 8 last year, department fire fighters had put out 335 fires which had burned over 6,507 acres. First fires broke the middle of March last year.

While rain and snow has altered the spring hazard, time-table seasonal fire officers and lookouts now are on the job along with regular personnel.
