Space Peas No Closer Than 1 Inch Apart

Edible pod peas, varieties which are grown for their pods like snap beans, and are harvested before the seeds form, are well worth trying.

For best yield, sow peas two inches deep and not closer than one inch apart in a single row. Even dwarf varieties appreciate some thing to climb, and the semi-tall and tall growing peas require support.
