dumping along the township roads has been noticed, Goers claimed. He said in several spots he had seen less refuse scattered along the road than was noticed in previous years.

Farmington Township's population growth is partially responsible for the excess of rubbish this year, Goers stated. The spring clean up is also later this year, and some residents insisted last fall's pickup, Goers said, adding that these factors are helping slow down the collections.

However, residents are still pleased with the service, he said. Handbills are placed in mailboxes a few days before the pickup is scheduled, and usually the crews keep their appointment, although in some cases they may be a day late.
