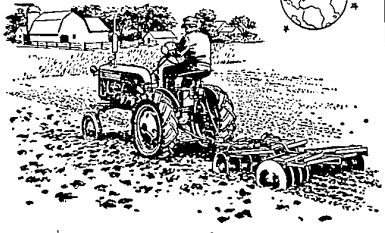

FARM FEATURES

Pastures Give Three Benefits

High quality pastures and forage give us three benefits, says George A. Brown, head of the Michigan State College animal husbandry department.

He points out that they help maintain livestock health, increase returns through more economical gains, and reduce labor and tillage costs.

Green pastures provide a liberal supply of protein, vitamins and minerals essential to the rapid growth and development of young animals. Succulent pastures all during the growing season and well-cured leafy roughage for winter feeding are our best guarantee against nutritional deficiencies, Brown stated.

Approximately 50 per cent of the feed of beef cattle is grass and forage and improvement of grass and forage means a cut in the cost of production, the livestock authority believes. Most economical beef gains come from the use of good pasture.

Sheep obtain from 90 to 95 per cent of their feed from grass or forage. Under ideal conditions, fat lambs can be produced without the use of any grain.

Good pastures for swine will bring a saving of from 10 to 15 per cent of the grain and 50 per cent of the protein supplement in swine rations. The risk of losses from parasites and nutritional diseases is also materially reduced by succulent pasture.

Ashes of wood, soft coal and hard coal are all valuable to loosen up heavy clay soil, but it is best to use soft coal ashes weather for a season, to get rid of toxic substances.

Hormone Treatment Brings Sterile Cows Into Milk, College Finds

Each year, Michigan dairy farmers must discard potentially valuable dairy heifers because of their failure to breed. Now, scientists at the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station have found that hormones will develop under growing and milk production. Sterile heifers and cows can be made to produce milk.

Dr. Joseph Meltes and Dr. E. P. Reinke, of the Michigan State College department of physiology and pharmacology, and Dr. C. F. Huff man of the MSC dairy department, conducted the study. They have revealed that two hormones—progesterone and diethylstilbestrol—caused sterile heifers to come in milk without calving and to produce amounts of milk that compare favorably with normal cows. Previous experiments elsewhere have shown that cows could be brought into milk with diethylstilbestrol alone, but undesirable "side effects" followed. Milk quantities were usually small or unobtainable and the cows became "bullish" and were not desirable in the herd. The use of the second hormone, progesterone, seems to have overcome the limitation of diethylstilbestrol treatment.

The udder of the normal heifer or cow fully developed during pregnancy as a result of natural activity of the two hormones. At about the time of calving, the milk-secreting hormone acts on the mammary tissue to bring quantities of milk. Using the hormones to treat sterile animals is believed to cause about the same reaction as is found in normal cows, though the animal does not have a calf.

In the experiment, the hormones were implanted in the shoulders of two Guernsey heifers.

The udder of the four-year-old heifer began filling 60 days after the hormones were first put in her system. Twice-a-day milking was begun on the sixty-fourth day. During the first 46 days of giving milk, the heifer produced 995.6 pounds of milk and 43.33 pounds of butterfat. The scientists say that this record compares favorably with

To help protect the edges of crystal pieces while they are in the dishpan, place a towel in the bottom of the pan. RURAL LEADERSHIP PARLEY PLANNED AT MSC JULY 10 - 21

Clergymen and lay leaders of rural America will gather at Michigan State College for the fourth annual Rural Leadership School July 10-21. More than 125 are expected to enroll in the three-year course, which is composed of three basic courses and ten elective subjects, according to Russell J. Kleis, director of special courses and conferences.

Training in group methods, community organizations and rural church programs form the nucleus of the course. Each group, churchmen and other organization leaders, are encouraged to cooperate in the overall aims of the community, Kleis said.

Classes are arranged on a three-year schedule, progressing from the fundamental methods of group interaction in the rural community to the more complex fields, such as "Nature and Religion" and "Social and Mental Health."

Michigan State College staff members will teach the 13 courses and conferees will be housed in the new Robert S. Shaw Hall.
