**MSC FURNISHES VOCATIONAL AID TO GRADUATES**

In order to assist the graduating seniors in choosing a career, the College Counseling Center of Michigan State College is sponsoring a Counseling Clinic for the summer months from May to September. It will help any graduate to decide whether or not he wishes to obtain a job in business or industry, to continue his education in college, or to seek specialized training in a business, technical, or trade school.

The schedule for the remainder of the summer is: June 1 - June 15 - 10, June 16 - 25, June 26 - July 10 - 12, July 19 - 21, August 7 - 9, August 22 - 25, and September 6 - 8. Students who are interested must register on the first day of each program at 5:30 a.m.

The greater part of the first day will be devoted to the testing program, which will include interest and personality inventories, academic aptitude, reading, and achievement tests.

A counselor will help each person by answering questions, explaining procedures, arranging individual conferences, discussing vocations, and interpreting test results.

The program also provides for tours of the campus and buildings, living in the dorms, learning of college songs, and ice-skating, swimming, bowling, ping-pong and dancing for recreation.
