Charge Homicide In 8 Mile Death

Edna Shenkle, driver of a car involved in a fatal accident May 10 at the corner of Eight Mile and Farmington Roads, demanded examination and furnished \$1000 bond May 19 when she was served with a warrant charging negligent homicide. Assistant county prosecutor Emmet Lebl charged the warrant.

Mrs. Shenkle is still at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac recovering from injuries suffered when the car she was driving collided with one driven by Loren E. Kelly of Pontiac and containing Kelly's wife, three year old son, and Perry Davis, 63, of Portland, Indiana. Davis died at Redford Receiving Hospital on May 18; John T. Springer, 57, a passenger in the Shenkle car, was dead on arrival at Redford Receiving Hospital.

The Kelly family were discharged within a week after the accident. The wreck occurred when the Shenkle car, traveling south on Farmington Road, collided almost head-on with the Kelly car, traveling north. The accident occurred, State Police say, when the car driven by Edna Shenkle failed to follow the curve in Farmington Road north of the Eight Mile intersection.

Preliminary examination will be held at the Farmington Municipal Court on June 2, at which time Mrs. Shenkle will be able to appear, according to Justice John J. Schulte Jr.
