But I'm sure not even Philip Bailey could write of the heart-throbs shown May 19 on the faces of seven blind boys and girls, students at the Lowrey grade school in Dearborn as they sat through the performance of the Cole Brothers Circus at the Olympic. They were the special guests of Hopalong Cassidy (Bill Boyd).

Box seats weren't good enough for them — they were placed right in the "big ring" so they could get the true feeling of circus dust. In special seats set up just for them, the children sat, accompanied by Miss Kay McCoy, Mrs. G. Woodrow, and Terry Washburn, who were looking after them. After the show, they were taken back stage, where the great Cassidy asked if he could "bug" each of his guests. Left almost speechless, they received a kiss and a photo, it was truly the ending of a great day.

The day started at 8:15 a.m. when Miss McCoy and Mr. Washburn gave a birthday party for two of the children, George Woodrow and Jackie Gebbink on their Sunshine Express program at WKMH. Blindness is an affliction which takes calmly, and common sense rules it should be so. But thank God for such people as Miss McCoy, who arranged plans for the whole day and evening that these children may always feel it's a wonderful world in which we live.

In regard to the present question of the lighted athletic field, I would like to submit the following facts and figures. The main reason for the proposed athletic field is the present condition of the athletic fund.

At the end of the 1949 school year, the fund faced a \$736.52 deficit. By the end of the present 1950 school year, it is estimated the fund will be \$1305.69 in the red, and the total estimated deficit in June of 1951 will be \$2392.69. This deficit is enough to hire a new teacher for a year, or pay another nurse, or buy much needed equipment for the school.

All the money used by the athletic board is in the best and most sparing way possible, but the income cannot match the money spent. This deficit is paid up by money from the General Fund. This means that the students must do without certain facilities. At the rate the athletic fund is falling behind, within 15 years the school would be without enough supplies to have play for the lighted athletic field, but we wouldn't be able to show for any of the equipment or the lighted field.

With a lighted athletic field there would be a profit instead of a deficit. On the average, four times as much money is taken in for night football games as day games.

Please! Remember the children in your school are more important than the money in your pocket!

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
