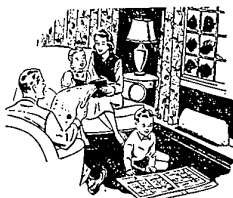

Mary Louise Huitts spent the week end with her grandparents in Wixom. She returned Monday night to her home.



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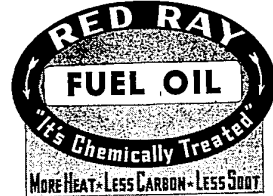
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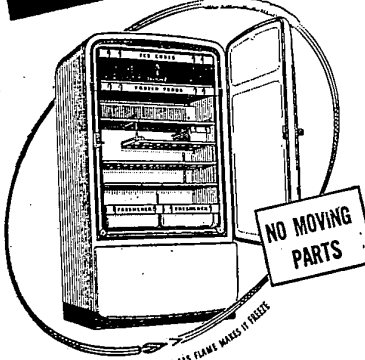
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
