NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that pursuant to an Order of the Board of Education of the School District of TOWNSHIP SCHOOL DISTRICT OF FARMINGTON TOWNSHIP that the Registration of the Qualified Electors of said District will take place on:

SATURDAY, JUNE 3, 1950
and at the time and places indicated below:

OFFICE OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS — 8:00 A.M. to 8:00 P.M.

and at any other time or place designated by said Board of Education.

TAKE NOTICE — THOSE QUALIFIED ELECTORS WHO HAVE PREVIOUSLY REGISTERED IN THIS SCHOOL DISTRICT NEED NOT RE-REGISTER. Provided that those in PERMANENT REGISTRATION DISTRICTS must vote in at least one election each four-year period to keep their name active on the Registration Book.

REGISTRATION BY AFFIDAVIT

Any absent voter whose name is not registered and who shall claim the right to vote by Absent Voter's Ballot at any Election or Special Election, may at the time of making application for Absent Voters' Ballot, present to the Secretary of the Board of Education, an affidavit for registration which is worded in proper form.

PROVISION IN CASE OF REMOVAL TO ANOTHER PRECINCT Any registered and qualified voter who has REMOVED from ONE ELECTION PRECINCT of a SCHOOL DISTRICT to another election precinct of the same SCHOOL DISTRICT, shall have the right, in any registration day, as provided, on application to the Secretary of Board of Education, to have his name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he HAS REMOVED to the registration book of the precinct in which he THEN RESIDES. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on any ELECTION or SPECIAL Election day, by obtaining from the Board of Inspectors of such Election or Special Election of the precinct from which he HAS REMOVED, a CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER, and presenting the said certificate to the BOARD OF ELECTION INSPECTORS OF THE PRECINCT IN WHICH HE THEN RESIDES.

stating: "The Moscow pact and Cairo and Tehran pacts are the answer to the prayers of millions of people that nations can get along together." . . . Better not let Senator McCarthy or Congressman Smathers see that. . . Also Gardner Cowles, Jr., publisher of Look, Quick and Flair praised the Russians in the same New Masses. So did A. M. Hamilton, vice president of American Locomotives. . . Incidentally, Earl Browder was expelled as boss of the Communist party for repeatedly arguing that Russia and capitalist America could live together harmoniously.

CAPITAL NEWS CAPSULES
Kansas City Clean-Up — Most interesting fact developed at the Kansas City crime probe is that racketeers are carefully obeying federal laws. They aren't afraid of state and city laws where local officials are easier to bribe. But they are afraid of federal laws. . . That's why the underworld is leaning over backward not to get caught in conspiracy. In Kansas City, at least, they operate in small groups, rather than in syndicates that cross state lines.

What McCarthy Really Said — Secretary of State Acheson now has two affidavits from people who heard and recorded Senator McCarthy's famous speech at Wheeling, West Virginia, stating that the state department had 205 card-carrying Communists. The manager of the local radio station, who recorded McCarthy's speech, is one of those who is giving the state department an affidavit.

Byrd's Lobby — Senators can thank their colleague, Harry Byrd of Virginia, for increasing their office work. Byrd secretly inspired a flood of telegrams to congress on deficit spending. He even dictated what several groups should say in Byrd's name to congress. The farm equipment association promptly appealed to his dealers to carry out Byrd's bidding, but warned: "Please do not mention Senator Byrd's name in your telegram to congressmen, and change the wording around so that all wires will not read the same."

Alken's Paid Audience — Good old Senator Alken of Vermont can add the name of another public official who has been speaking to paid audiences — himself. Alken stirred up a national hoopla over the fact that the agriculture department paid Minnesota county committeemen to hear Secretary of Agriculture Brannan speak in St. Paul. But the other night, Alken himself, addressed a similar meeting of Vermont county committeemen in Burlington. They were also paid, as is the custom in every state.

U. S. Cold-War Strategy — GHQ for the new cold war offensive will be the grimy old state, war and navy building next door to the House. The planning of strategy will be by two agencies known to few Americans — the national security council and the national security resources board. They will call the signals for the defense department, atomic energy commission, the state department, ECA, and other agencies. This explains why Stuart Symington, a held-up operator, was taken from his post as secretary of state to run the resources board.

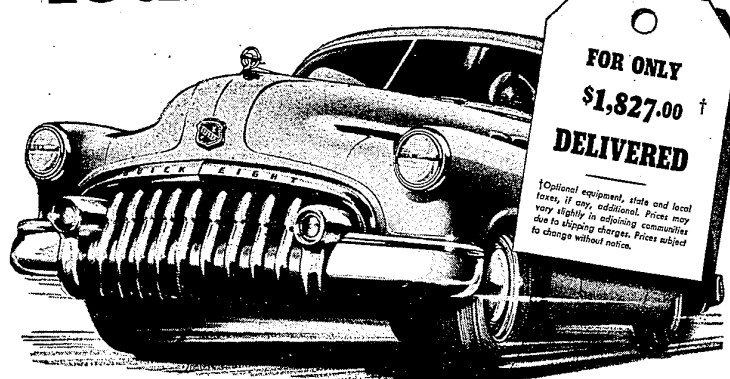
