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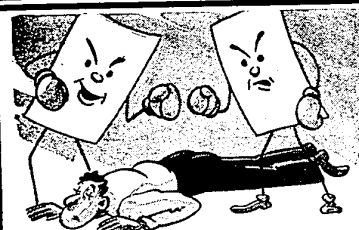

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70 More Mapped Lakes Bring Total To 1900

Five conservation department lake mapping crews have finished surveying 70 lakes in 15 counties, bringing the total number of Michigan lakes now reduced to map

paper to nearly 1,900.

The department's fish division points out that the new maps will not be available to fishermen and others until about September 1. Work is not complete. Physical mapping and sounding will be followed next month by a biological survey and inventory of the 70 lakes.

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
