NEW "SHOT" CLINIC TO OPEN JUNE 13 AT CLARENCEVILLE

A special immunization clinic for pre-school children in the Clarenceville School District will be held Tuesday, June 13, Louis Schmidt, Superintendent, announced this week.

The program is under the joint sponsorship of the Mothers' Clubs, P. T. A. and the Clarenceville Schools. Similar clinics have been held in the Clarenceville School District before, but never exclusively for pre-school children. Immunization will begin at 1:30 p.m. on June 13 in the Homemaking House, 20210 Middlebelt Road, next to the high school of the bulletin.

A charge of 50c per injection will be made, Schmidt stated. Three injections are necessary. Schmidt added that if at this time parents are unable to pay the fee, they should feel free to contact the committee. He stated that it is hoped that every pre-school child will be immunized under the program.

(Continued from Page One) too; Saturday she received a letter from a TB patient who had resigned himself to spending the rest of his life in the hospital. According to the letter, latest x-rays showed the patient to be recovering — a recovery started by a visit to the Sunshine Lady had engineered.

However, Mrs. Terreault now says her work will be limited to writing a column each week for The Enterprise; she says the column is responsible for many cards and letters to shut-ins. Mrs. Terreault said that since the death of her husband in February, there is no longer the family income necessary to supply the cards and postage her project needs. The family has had to meet medical expenses and living mainly on Social Security payments, can no longer divert a portion of its meager income to the "friendship" cards Mrs. Terreault sends.

The Sunshine Lady doesn't send "Get Well" cards, she says, because many of her shut-ins are hopeless invalids who have given up. So she sends other cards, colorful, cheerful cards sometimes at the rate of 300 a week. It's this expense that Mrs. Terreault must temper.

The Sunshine Lady got started in her unique hobby in 1935 when she spent two years in the Oakland County Infirmary. It was there she says, that she became aware of the great neglect of the shut-ins. She says many of the people in the infirmary received no visitors during the two years she was there. Others never received cards by this or to work, drawing little pictures and mailing them to other patients. This was at a time when it wasn't positive whether or not she would ever be released from the infirmary.

In 1941, she received encouragement in her project by Walter Disney and the Amos 'N' Andy radio.
