## Sincerely Yours . . . State And Local Authorities Tangle On Night Field Safety Factors

Dear Mr. Heckman:

In response to your letter of May 17, 1950, a survey was made May 29 to determine if the proposed site of the new Farmington High School Athletic Field would be good from the standpoint of accessibility, use of traffic flow, and safety.

The following persons participated in the survey: Corporal Joseph Chaput, Michigan State Police; Mr. Sam Levin, Michigan State Police Highway Department; Mr. Gordon Fowle, Michigan State Highway Department; Mr. Joseph DeVriendt, Chief, Farmington Police Department; and Mr. Frank Van Atta, Deputy Sheriff, Oakland County.

It was mutually agreed by those participating in the survey that the proposed site of the new athletic field is not good from a traffic safety standpoint.

1. Because of the distance from the schools and town area, most persons going to the proposed site of the athletic field would travel by motor vehicle, or bicycle, although there undoubtedly would be pedestrian travel, too.

2. The location of present schools, all of which are located in the north of Grand River, this would require participants, students and others to cross both Grand River and the U. S. 16 Cut-Off to get to the proposed site.

3. The latter is a highway carrying heavy "through traffic" and the intersections normally used to cross, Farmington and Gill Roads, have been the subject of remedial attention for some time. Any substantial addition in cross-traffic must be expected to aggravate the situation.

4. For these reasons, many of them, inexperienced drivers, traveling to and from the field undoubtedly would add to the accident toll. Experience indicates that young drivers are more prone to speed and take chances than mature drivers.

Young people, too, are more apt to become excited or downcast depending on the outcome of a game and such emotional reactions are not conducive to safe driving.

5. The distance of the proposed site from the downtown area and the need for traffic supervision would add to the enforcement problem confronted by local police. Use of the site also would impose traffic control problems on other agencies over and above those which are already critical.

## Sift Results Of Hook On Undersize Fish

What happens to the undersize fish caught by anglers and returned to the water?

To find out the effect of hooking on fly-caught and bait-caught specimens, the conservation department's institute for fisheries research will tag and release 200 sublegal and legal hatchery-brook trout in an experimental section of Hunt creek, Montmorency county.

Project will begin May 12 under guidance of Dr. D. S. Shetter of the institute.

Fish will be segregated, 100 on each side of a blocking screen. One stream section will be fished with flies, the other with bait. Any wild fish caught will be tagged.
