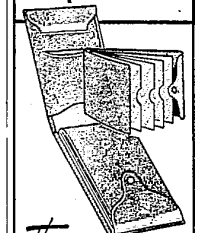

Susan Joseph of Jefferson Street has recovered from her recent illness and is able to enjoy these warm summer days with her many playmates.

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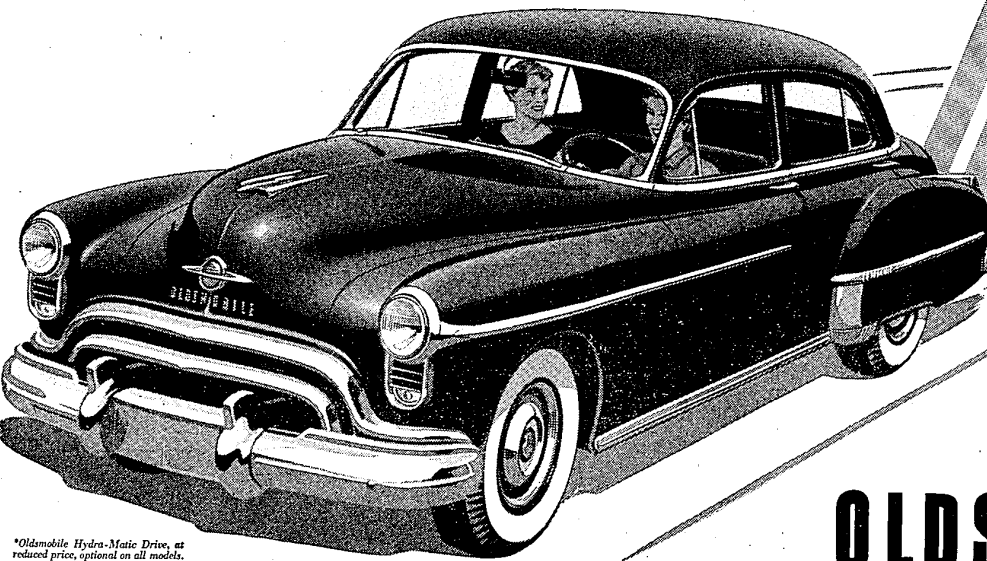
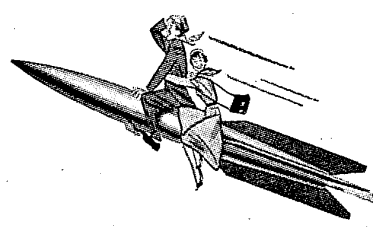


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
