There are now 301 three year olds in the district.

Similar drastic increases are coming sooner. There are now 239 five year olds in the district, only 163 students were graduated from the high school this year. The Seniors' places have been filled by 134 students entering the seventh grade next year.

Next year's graduating class of 95 will be replaced by 167 students now in the fifth grade, and the next graduating class of 96 will be replaced by 173 students in the fourth grade now.

But the elementary system still shows the greatest increase. Between 1946 and 1950, the number of children in the district between the ages of one to four jumped 112.4%. In the 5-9 age group the jump was 33.7%. In the 10-14 group it was 33.4%. These increases weren't from the rising birth rate, which doesn't effect youngsters a year old or more. They were caused directly by migration, chiefly by families with very young children.

Present in the district right now are 275 three year olds, 303 two-year-olds, 301 three-year-olds, and 231 four-year-olds. They will be entering school, or 95% of them at least, will be enrolled within the next four years. And each of these groups can be expected to swell at the rate of nearly 24% per year.

Where we are going to put them is the question. Already plans are made to put the elementary system on half day sessions; the first through fifth grades at the 10 Mile Road School will share two four hour sessions next year. The first and second grades at the new Middlebelt Road School will similarly be on short days.

There is double reason for the half-day sessions. One is the increase in number of elementary pupils, the other is the need for more high school space. Consequently, the Farmington Elementary School will give way to high school use, and the other elementary schools will absorb the elementary grades thus evicted by going on half day sessions.

But even splitting up the sessions won't help long. Superintendent Duncanson says by the end of the 1950-51 school year, the schools will be all through splitting sessions. There just won't be room.

Then what?

That's a question Duncanson can't answer. But the need for starting a new building program is apparent. And as Duncanson says, "It is later than you think."

ed the Annual Meeting of the Clarenceville School District Monday evening in the Clarenceville High School. William Lawson read the minutes of the last annual meeting and the annual report of the School District. Hubert Earle gave the Annual Financial Report of the District.

Mr. Hubert Marx made a motion that the Board of Education serve without pay for the coming year. A secret ballot was called for and all were appointed by Harold Hoppe, president of the board. The motion lost 33 to 17. A motion to reduce the salaries of the Board of Education from \$1,575 to \$875, the Board to decide the division in accordance with generally accepted Boards of Education practices, was presented by Mr. J. Nicholas. The motion passed 25 to 13.

Nicholas then moved that the \$1,000 saved as a result of the reduction in Board salaries be used toward the salary of a book-keeper — secretary to handle all financial books and records of the District plus other books and records as the Board deems advisable. After considerable discussion the motion lost by a show of hands vote.

Mr. Henry Bracken moved that the Farmington State Bank continue to be used as the official banking agent for the District. The motion was approved.
