BOYS REPUBLIC GETS VISITOR FROM ABROAD

Europe's recent trend toward adopting American methods of coping with delinquent problems has brought many visitors from abroad to study the philosophies of corrective schools in this country, including the Boys Republic at Inkster and Nine Mile Roads.

The latest such visitor at the Republic last week was Monsignor John Patrick Carroll-Abbing of Santa Marinella, Italy, who heads "The Boys Republic of Italy," a school similar in many respects to our local Boys Republic.

At an Open House Friday evening at the home of Superintendent and Mrs. Saltzger, the Monsignor told many interesting details about his school, which, curiously enough, is largely maintained by contributions from American organizations and individuals.

The school, located forty miles from Rome, was started with only twenty boys, and now houses 175, most of whom — victims of the late war — were homeless waifs roaming in lawless groups in the streets of nearby cities. The school comprises three units — an agricultural village, a general industrial village, and a shipbuilding and fishing village. The boys are chosen to live and learn in these villages according to their aptitudes and interests. The Monsignor states that through these training channels many who were tough, maladjusted, unhappy street urchins have already completed the courses and become rehabilitated, self-supporting young men.

On Sunday Monsignor Carroll-Abbing and Mr. Charles E. Henry, executive director of our nearby Boys Republic, were guests of Mr. George Cushing, vice-president of WJL in his "Our Opinion" hour.

The Monsignor is spending this month visiting various schools in this country, as well as juvenile court judges from whom he is seeking criticisms on his book on juvenile court procedure, which is being prepared for the publishers.

Walter S. Cross of Fitchburg, Mass., has been named president of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass. It was announced in Boston last week.

Mr. Cross has been active in various capacities in the Christian Science movement — having joined The Mother Church in 1905 — and for many years has been a Christian Science practitioner.

During World War I he was an Army chaplain with the 39th and 27th Divisions. He later served at the Christian Science War Relief Depot at Le Mans, France.

Prior to World War I he served as Christian Science Committee on Publication for the State of Maryland. He has served on the Bible Lesson Committee which prepares the Lesson-Sermons used by all Christian Science churches for their Sunday services.

Mr. Cross is a graduate of Yale University, and alumnus of Phillips Academy at Andover, Mass. He is a native of Fitchburg, Mass.

Yellow Perch Account For 90% of Total Take

Great Lakes sport fishermen know that yellow perch regularly dominate their catches but they may be surprised to learn that this species is estimated to have accounted for over 90 per cent of their total take last year.

Anglers on Great Lakes, including connecting waters, averaged a record of 3.66 fish per hour of fishing. The conservation department's Institute for Fisheries research reveals this is the highest percentage of perch since 1945 when 86.4 per cent were perch. In 1948, yellow perch made up 85.2 per cent of the take. General creel census reports started in 1942.

ested in Michigan State. It will be held at Don Robinson's on Six Mile Road. The time and date will be announced later. Card games followed the business meeting.

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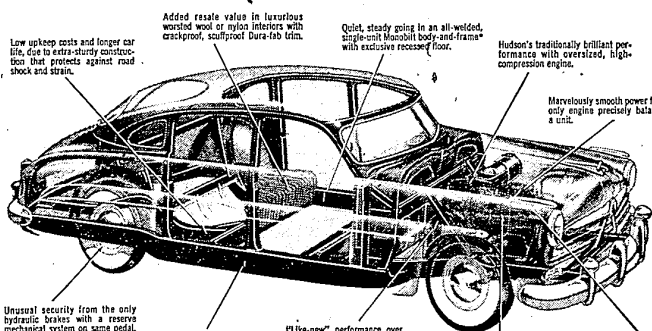
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
