ment — but actually by the consumer in the form of withholding taxes. The so-called "high cost" of eye glasses, due to the secret kickback, thus has become a matter of national concern to practicing physicians and surgeons.

The Michigan State Medical Society has organized a "good citizen campaign" among its members. This program is aimed at "getting out the vote at the 1950 November election" — and specifically getting out votes to defeat any candidate, regardless of party, who favors socialist medicine.

To bring the message of voluntary medicine to the American people, the AMA recently engaged Whitaker to serve as its director for a nation-wide program. Whitaker appeared before newspaper editors in Chicago last November at a conference sponsored by the National Editorial Association.

"The American press, in its vigilant crusade to prevent Government seizure of unvarnished power over the people, has been the Nation's strongest defense against State Socialism," Whitaker declared.

"The citizens of our country will be a captive people, held captive by their own Government, within another five years, if the trend toward concentration of power in Washington is not halted. The American press, standing alone, cannot long prevent that disaster."

"The American people must be aroused to come to their own defense; they must be told the blunt truth — that a Welfare State is a slave state — and that the cancerous growth of Government dependency is the most dangerous sickness in our world today."

"American doctors have become the second greatest force in the Nation, second only to the American press, in alerting the people to the danger of a Socialized State."

"The doctors are mobilizing all over this country not only to protect their profession and the public health from the scourge of socialized medicine, but to fight for the right of every American to practice his own trade or profession as a free man in a free country."

FRANK SENATOR

It isn't often that a Senator will argue openly against government economy. No matter what he may think personally, he knows that government economy is a big vote-getter. However, big Ed Johnson, Colorado Democrat, solemnly vowed the other day against too much economizing at the expense of democratic principles.

"We do not establish governments to save dollars; we establish governments so that the people may govern," Big Ed told his senate colleagues.

"The planners say that if big business was run like government, it would be bankrupt overnight," continued the senator from Colorado. "Now that is a pretty plausible argument, and every unfurnished person the country over swallows it and repeats it. Well-meaning propaganda groups throughout the country play that tune. I concede, in fact, that our government is more wasteful and more inefficient than a streamlined dictatorship, and that its operating efficiency does not look good when placed alongside that of American business organizations."

"But is that what we are striving for?" boomed Johnson. "Are we forgetting that we are trying to maintain a democratic system of representative government here in America? All of us, I am sure, would have no hesitation in choosing between a highly efficient administration by a dictator in a totalitarian state."

"The American businessman and the American worker must understand the kind of cake that is hidden under the pretty frosting," Johnson warned.

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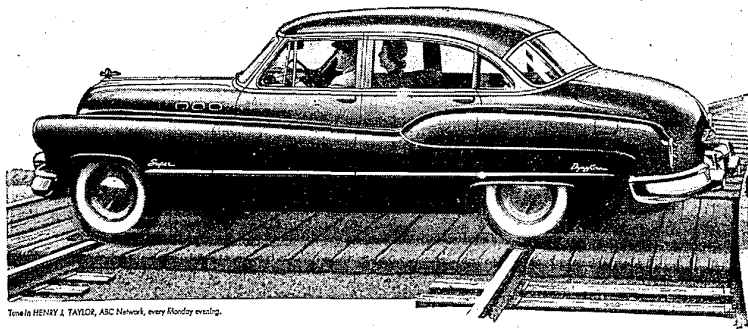
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
