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The promotion of Ronald Auble, farm forester stationed at Grand Rapids, to the position of regional forester at Roscommon to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Sam A. Cline has been announced by the conservation department's forestry division.

Auble began work with the conservation department in 1929. In 1941 he entered military service with the cavalry and in 1943 transferred to the air corps. He served as a flight instructor on the west coast and with the military government in Korea. Auble returned to state service in 1947. He is a native of Grand Rapids and a graduate of Michigan State College. His successor as farm forester has not yet been named.

The forestry division has also announced the promotion of Glenn Schaap from district forester, Sturgeon River state forest, to a state forest administrative position in the Lansing office. James Lamy, Lansing office, has been promoted to replace Schaap as district forester at Sturgeon River state forest.

The field administration division of the conservation department plans to post approximately 500 signs, mostly in the Saginaw Valley sugar beet area.

Post Laws In Spanish
In Sugar Beet Areas

Simple explanations of game and fish laws in English with Spanish translation are again being posted in the state's sugar beet areas as an aid to migratory Mexican workers who might get into trouble through ignorance of conservation regulations. This is the second year, Spanish has been used on conservation signs for the benefit of migrants who are American citizens but have come to Michigan from Texas near the Mexican border and are more familiar with the Spanish language than with English.

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Forecasts Optimistic
For 1950 Duck Season

Larger counts of nesting ducks in southern Michigan counties and favorable weather and water conditions in recent weeks inspire optimistic forecasts of more locally-reared ducks next fall.

Aerial censuses on two downstate areas, one in Barry county, the other in Ingham, Livingston and Oakland counties, conducted by the conservation department, show gains for both 1949 and 1950 over 1948. This year's count in Barry county showed a decrease compared to last year but is better than the 1948 index.

Checks in 13 sample areas farthel north also show an increase in the nesting population compared to last year.



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
