ment), he asked if the state department had any idea who might have been responsible for this material (secret documents) emanating from the state department. "That was about all Donovan had to say. In fact, he seemed in a hurry to get off to Europe. TRYGVE LIE AND TRUMAN Here is the inside story of what happened when U. S. Secretary General Trygve Lie met with President Truman and Secretary Acheson following Lie's return from Moscow.

Lie first reported on the strong desire for peace which he found everywhere from Moscow to Washington; then asked the President to consider sending Acheson to a special meeting of the United Nations security council in Geneva this summer, a meeting which he said was imperative to keep the United Nations from collapsing.

Mr. Truman's reaction was immediate. He promptly said, he could do no such thing; that it would be a cruel hoax to play on the American people when there is absolutely no chance of agreement with Russia. The only thing Russia understands, the President argued, is force, and the West is going to build up its own force until Russia realizes the democracies mean business. After that, perhaps a meeting with Russia might produce some good.

As it is now, Truman told the U. N. secretary general, Russia is boycotting the United Nations because it won't recognize Communist China—just like a little boy who says he won't play in the game unless he can be captain of the team.

CAPITAL NEWS CASULETS Ambassador Kirk has cabled the state department that the Russian general who was suddenly recalled from Japan with his entire 62-man staff has suffered the same fate as Marshall Zhukov. He's being demoted and disgraced—because he was too chummy with American and British personnel in Tokyo.

Kirk says General Kuzma Derzhyanko committed what is the supreme heresy—he actually believed the east and west could get along.

Parents HELP CHILDREN BY LIMITING BEHAVIOR

Parents may have the idea that they should let a child do just what he pleases and when he pleases and should trust the child's judgment. They feel he will grow in spite of his parents.

This lack of parental restraint is not one of the best ways to give a young child a feeling of sureness, certainty and therefore security, reports Jean Foulkrod, child development instructor at Michigan State College.

A mother who can love her child but at the same time see the need for "putting on the brakes" on his behavior at times, is really helping the child grow, according to Miss Foulkrod. For example, a child may want to bite or kick when you stop him from writing with crayon on the wallpaper. Then you need to tell the child of two "limits" at one time. He may not hurt people—or wall paper.

The child specialist thinks he may not like you for limiting these activities at the time but now he knows he is not to kick you and that writing paper is better for crayons than wallpaper. He will wonder no longer whether he can get away with these things and you have made him more secure by removing that many uncertainties. He is sure of a few things and knows that someone is helping him make up his mind about things which are a little too big for him. "Young people need the firm reassuring guidance of parents. They need certain limits they cannot go beyond. It gives them a feeling of security and children need that," Miss Foulkrod reports.

"Lost" Fawns Aren't Orphans, State Says

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HARVEY BARNES TO TAKE COURSE AT NAVAL BASE

Harvey L. Barnes of 21019 Ontonago, a University of Michigan junior, will begin a two-week training course at the Naval Amphibious Base in Little Creek, Virginia, beginning July 8.

Barnes, one of 950 Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps midshipmen, will receive instructions on shore and afloat in amphibious operations. During the first week, devoted to shore training, he will learn through practical work, lectures and demonstrations, the essentials of preparing a successful amphibious landing.

The following week he will receive instructions in the afloat part of his amphibious education with indoctrination in shipboard routine aboard vessels of the Amphibious Force. He will witness a coordinated sea-and-air live-fire demonstration attack on an "enemy" island

and will participate in a rehearsal landing employing sea-air support. To climax his training he will take part in a full-dress assault and Marine Corps Reserve troops

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
