State archery championship tournament, sponsored by the Michigan Archery Association, has been set for September 10 at the Pontiac lake recreation area, the conservation department reports.

State archers also are invited to compete in the fourth annual metropolitan tournament of the Association of Metropolitan Clubs of Detroit, which is scheduled at the Pontiac area on July 30.

Michigan plays host to the three-day national field archery tournament which will draw top archers from many states to East Tawas August 18 to 21. Contestants who plan to tent or trailer camp may be accommodated at the East Tawas state park.

Michigan had the honor of being host to what amounts to the "World Series" of field archery as recently as 1946 at the Allegan state forest.
