

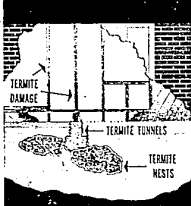
FARMINGTON W.C.T.U.

She summoned brother Don and together they rowed a quarter mile out in the lake where the children had drifted. Don dove in immediately, finding the child deep in weeds. He had been under several minutes.

Borden Award Goes To MSC Professor

Dr. Margaret Ohlson, head of the foods and nutrition department at Michigan State College, received the annual Borden Award at the mid-century dinner of the American Home Economics association in Boston, July 15.

Cited for outstanding fundamental human nutrition research, the MSC home economist was selected for the honor by the Borden Award committee on the basis of papers published during the past three years.

Her studies on the nutritional status of women, energy metabolism, and the metabolism of nitrogen and certain minerals and vitamins were described as being fundamental and of great import in the field.

Each year, one member of the national home economics group is selected for the award.

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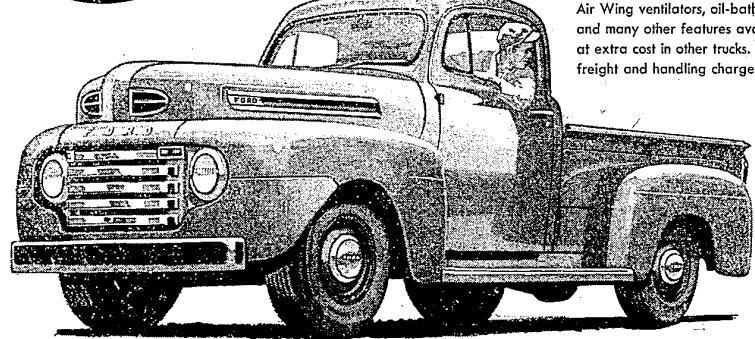
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
