Bidding a high average of \$4 cents an acre for wildcat land, 21 oil companies and independent operators leased 29,576 acres for \$28,324 at state conservation department public auction.

Nearly 39,000 approved acres were offered for oil and gas exploration by the Brazos Oil and Gas Company of Houston leasing 13,735 acres. The Houston firm also made the top bid of \$15.25 an acre for 40 wildcat acres in the proven St. Helen field in Roscommon County.

Only proven acreage offered, two 40-acre parcels in the St. Helen field and Butman field, Gladwin county, commanded an average total price of \$3,530.

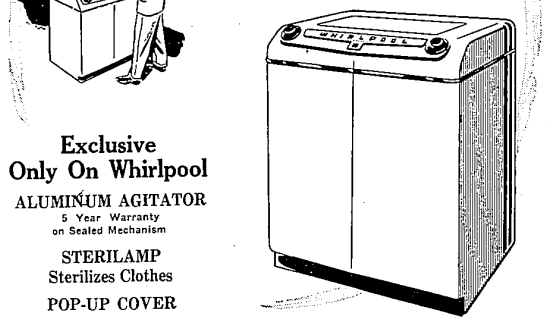
