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Home Canning Warnings Issued By State Public Health Department

Improperly canned food can be poisonous when it neither looks appetizing nor tastes good, the Michigan Department of Health warns.

Can everything except tomatoes and fruit by the pressure cooker method, it is as all possible. When non-acid food such as vegetables, meat and poultry are canned by any other method, the contents of each must be boiled for at least 15 minutes before they are even tasted. Use boiling water bath for fruits and tomatoes only. Cold pack fruits and vegetables. Never can lima beans or corn in any other way than the pressure cooker. Even pressure cooking cannot make these vegetables safe in larger containers.

Never can in the oven. The danger of explosions and burns is too great, and then the product canned in the crowded oven may not be safe.

Get the latest government time tables and directions for any type of canning and follow them exactly. Use only those time tables and directions issued since 1947.

Be sure that all food for canning, hands, towels and all canning equipment including jars and lids, are immaculately clean. Read carefully and observe the manufacturer's instructions for the type of lid you are using.

Keep the pressure cooker's pot clean and gauge clean. Have the gauge checked by its manufacturer. Prepare only one load for the

Set Loan Rate For County Wheat

A basic loan rate for 1950-crop wheat produced in Oakland County of \$2.07 per bushel was announced this week by the Production and Marketing Administration county committee. Last year's rate was \$2.02 per bushel.

The basic rate applies to wheat grading U.S. No. 1, Mr. Cook, committee chairman, points out. Wheat produced on farms cooperating in the 1950 wheat acreage allotment program grading No. 3 or better, or No. 4 or No. 5 because of test weight or because it contains wheat of the classes durum and/or red durum, will be eligible for Commodity Credit Corporation loan or purchase agreement. The chairman says that a schedule of premiums and discounts for the various qualities of 1950-crop wheat will be issued at an early date and will be available for inspection at the county PMA office in Pontiac.

To be eligible for the loan, wheat must be placed in an approved storage either on the farm or in a commercial warehouse or elevator, according to the chairman. He points out further that storage at elevators will be continued for 1950-crop wheat on the same general basis as last year.

Mr. Cook explains that the county rate is based on a national average rate of \$1.93 a bushel to farmers as announced by PMA on June 30. The equivalent average rate for U. S. No. 1 wheat is \$2.00 per bushel.

The Agricultural Act of 1949 requires that the price of 1950-crop wheat be supported to farmers at 90 per cent of the parity price on July 1, 1950, the beginning of the marketing season. Mr. Cook remarks that the July 1 wheat parity price was \$2.21 a bushel. For the same date last year the wheat parity price was \$2.17 per bushel.

Loans and purchase agreements will be available from CCC through the county PMA office, in accordance with the program provisions, from time of harvest through January, 1951. They will mature on April 30, 1951, or earlier, on demand.
