

Schoolcraft Adds 7 Technical Programs

Schoolcraft College has initiated seven new programs which will begin next fall. College trustees approved one-year programs in refrigeration, air conditioning, heating and industrial security.

requested programs and workshops where they can continue their training. Schoolcraft will be the only college in Michigan to offer the program. The new program won't mean an increase in faculty members, although some part-time instructors might be needed to supplement the staff.

Approximately 15 students are anticipated in the first year, and the maximum enrollment of 25 students is expected later.

Courses for the piano teachers include applied music; piano; music theory; music history and piano teaching techniques.

The advisory committee consisted of Marian Abramson, chairman of the piano teaching committee at Oakland University; Albert Fillmore, president of the Detroit Musician League of Detroit; Institute of Musical

Arts; Lynn Lynch, piano pedagogy instructor at the University of Michigan; Marion Sticksel, president of the Livonia Piano Teachers Forum; Richard Saunders, director of fine arts at Schoolcraft; and Donald Morelock, Schoolcraft music instructor.

The need for technicians in refrigeration, air conditioning and heating prompted the college to start these programs as well as climate systems technology which includes the three.

Some courses in heating and air conditioning have been offered at the college through the apprenticeship program.

Approximately 120 students are anticipated during the first year, 350 in the second and 475 in the third year.

Eleven courses will be added, including basic refrigeration and air conditioning.

hermetic systems for refrigeration and air conditioning, commercial refrigeration systems, refrigeration code, commercial packaged air conditioning basic heating, heating code, assembled air conditioning system, forced air heating, hydraulic heating and applied electricity.

Part time faculty members will handle the programs in the first year, but more will be added later.

The American Society for Industrial Security and Security Services Inc. made inquiries at Schoolcraft on development of a program to prepare security personnel.

Schoolcraft decided to offer the program to prepare individuals for positions with public and private security agencies and to upgrade those currently employed.

Six courses will be taught by part-time faculty including civil and criminal law, security administration, principles of loss prevention, physical security systems, current security problems, and labor and management relations.

Advisory committee members include Jim Balaz, as-

stant to the president of Bonded Security; Jack Bologna, regional vice president of Intertel; Carl Carter, assistant vice president and director of Security for National Bank of Detroit; John

Clisch and Ray Coger, both detective lieutenants of Michigan State Police licensing unit.

Also on the committee were Clay Fechter, Schoolcraft's director of social sci-

ences. Fred Stefanski, Schoolcraft dean of arts and sciences, C.J. Marchi, director of airport security programs for Intertel; and Christopher Kokolakis, a retired FBI agent.

Schoolcraft Tuition Will Remain Level

Schoolcraft College's tuition will not go up next year despite the financial woes that have plagued Schoolcraft and other Michigan community colleges.

College trustees voted to keep tuition rates the same as the current year during the same meeting when they reviewed a budget \$235,000 leaner than was anticipated when the fiscal year began.

Tuition will remain at \$11 per credit for in-district students, \$22 for out-of-district students and \$33 for out-of-state students.

The college's district includes Livonia, Clarenceville, Plymouth, Northville and Garden City School districts. These tuition rates represent a 10 per cent increase over the 1971-72 school year.

"Since we increased tuition rates by 10 per cent last year, we don't feel we should put an additional burden on the students for a subsequent year," College President C. Nelson Grote said.

Dr. Grote also gave trustees a general overview of the 1972-73 revised operating budget. The budget approved in July was set at \$6.6 million but had to be cut because of a sharp decline in student enrollments and

number of credit hours taken. The revised budget as of March 28 is set at \$6.29 million but could be revised again depending on spring enrollments.

"This has not been easy," Dr. Grote told the board. "I appreciate the support of my staff for getting down and nixed and doing it."

"We think we will achieve a balanced budget," he

added. "It may be we can reinstate part of this after spring registration."

The revision did not cause a reduction in staff, support staff, laying off anyone or any major curtailment of services, Grote said.

Approximately \$160,000 was cut from the instructional budget, \$70,000 from the contingency and transfer funds and \$10,000 from plant operations as well as other reductions.

Crosby Leaving Realtors Group

William W. Bowman, president of the area realtors group, said Crosby's resignation was accepted with deep regret.
