Livonial will be one of the prime benefactors of an "academically talented" provision in the bill to support trograms for exceptional students, Pursell said.
A similar provision was vetoed out of last year's appropriations bill, but Pursell said he will "guarantee" that Esso.000 provision will remain in this bill.

The bill includes provisions for the next two years including \$39 per pupil per mill for the first 25 mills levied in 1974-75 and \$40 per mill regardless of the levy in 1975-76.

Although the bill has been hailed as the first to look at long-range school financing, Pursell said he doesn't agree.

"I still support a reduction of millage to 10.11, 12, or 13 mills," he said. "If that passed, it would very drastically change the tax structure."

Pursell said that there is a possibility the school millage rate would be set at 13 mills in the state with the balance made up from an income tax increase.

"I think from a stability standpoint it would give us much more stability in school financing to have two sources of income," he said.

## Schoolcraft Policy Changed On Admissions

Schoolcraft College will stop giving preferential treat-ment to in-district students in compliance with a new state regulation.

The college's trustees have approved a new policy eliminating a former provision which; said non-residents will be considered on the same basis as residents only when they qualify for the curriculum of their choice and when there remain openings in courses necessary for the curriculum elected."

Residents of the college district include those in the Clarenceville, Plymouth, Li-vonia, Garden City and Northville school districts.
