### ALLOW YEAR-ROUND BEAR HUNTING IN HOUGHTON COUNTY

Bear may be hunted the year around in Houghton County hereafter, it having been removed from the list of counties where the animals are protected except during regular open seasons, according to the conservation department.

The counties protecting bear are Alcona, Alpena, Antrim, Arenac, Benzie, Charlevoix, Cheboygan, Clare, Crawford, Emmet, Gladwin, Gogebic, Grand Traverse, Iosco, Isabella, Kalamazoo, Keweenaw, Lake, Leelanau, Mackinac, Manistee, Marquette, Mason, Mecosta, Midland, Montmorency, Muskegon, Newaygo, Oceana, Osceola, Oshtemo, Presque Isle, Roscommon and Wexford.

In these counties, bear may be hunted with bow and arrow from October 1 through November 5. They may be hunted with guns or bow and arrow during the regular deer season, November 15-30.

Open season on woodchuck in northern counties of the lower peninsula is October 15 - January 31 inclusive; in southern counties, October 15 to December 31 inclusive. Woodchuck may be taken at any time in the upper peninsula.

Raccoon may be hunted November 1 - 14 inclusive in the upper peninsula, November 1 to December 15 below the Straits; trapper from November 1 to 20 in the upper peninsula, November 15 to December 15 in northern counties of the lower peninsula; and December 1 to 15 in the southern counties.

Open season for hunting mink in the upper peninsula is November 1 to December 31; dates are November 1 to January 31 in the lower peninsula. Mink trapping seasons are November 1 to 30 in the upper peninsula; November 15 to December 15 in northern counties of the lower peninsula, except that no trapping will be permitted in part of the Dead Stream area in Roscommon County; and December 1 to 31 in southern counties.

Open season on skunk and badger extends from November 1 to January 31 in all of the state.

Full of youth and vitality, Mr. Brammer's brisk manner and pink cheeks belie his 80 years. Possessing a very keen mind, he attended Berlin, a night school in Copenhagen. In studying English so he would be able to converse better with his son. "I had English in school about 60 years ago but I don't think I should know more," he said. "So I decided to go to school again." Mr. Brammer was a railroad man, appointed by the king in Copenhagen, until his retirement in 1935. He speaks several languages.

When asked how he liked this country, he said that first he liked Farmington very much. Second on his list would be all of the cars that daily line our highways. In Denmark there are very few cars and the main means of transportation is the bicycle.

Mr. Brammer doesn't have much spare time in his days in Copenhagen. He does all his own house-keeping, a full time job in itself, besides taking numerous walks and visiting his friends, who add up to quite a total since he has been making them since he was born in Copenhagen on June 21, 1870.

Mr. Brammer has two sons, Albert and Berge, and a daughter, Betty, who live in Denmark. A brother-in-law, John Hansen, lives in Chicago.

### Trout To Be Planted In Designated Lakes

Conservation department lake survey crews are analyzing the first of some 26 selected lakes in 11 counties which may be capable of supporting trout.

Preliminary surveys show nearly all of these lakes have depth of 40 feet or more and should water analysis indicate the right combination of low temperatures and sufficient oxygen in bottom layers, experimental plantings will be made. Most lakes would get rain-bows, but others which appear to have the proper requisites would be stocked with brook and a few brown trout.

Several lakes on the list are known to have had some planting in past years but no chemical or temperature checks have ever been made by fishermen men.

Lake which crews do not get to examine this season will be tested in succeeding summers along with others which might be added to the list.

Other survey work now in progress on other lakes includes population studies, depth soundings, bottom soil tests and bass planting survivals. A total of five crews are working on assignments all over the state.

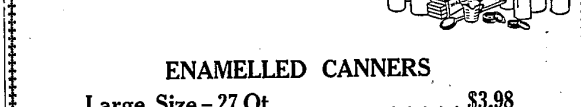
