## OFFERS ADVICE IN PRESERVING NEW CROP OF PEAS

Local crops of fresh peas are available now for table use and for preserving for next winter for your family's enjoyment then.

You can preserve their fresh flavor by canning or freezing if you use correct modern methods, advises Roberta Hershey, extension foods specialist at Michigan State College.

If you are canning the peas, cover the shelled and washed peas with boiling water and then bring them to a boil. Pack the hot peas in glass jars but be sure to leave one inch of space at the top of the jar as you cover the peas with boiling water.

Add one-half teaspoon salt to plants and one teaspoon salt to water. Adjust the jar lids and process in a pressure canner at 10 pounds pressure for 40 minutes for pints or quarts. If three or four pints are to be processed in a pressure saucepan rather than in a pressure canner, they should be processed for 60 minutes at 10 pounds pressure. Pressure saucepans should not be used for canning unless they are equipped with a pressure control device. As soon as you remove jars from canner, complete seals if they are not self-sealing.

It is important to use a recommended variety of peas as some may not freeze well. Thomas Laxton, Ontario, and Shasta varieties are suitable for freezing. Avoid overripe or immature peas and handle quickly from time of harvest to freezing to preserve quality and flavor.

Peas should be blanched before packaging for freezing. Place enough for one package in a square of cheesecloth. Blanch in one gallon of boiling water for one and one-half minutes. Cool immediately in running water or in ice water. Pack in moisture-vapor-proof bags, leaving space for expansion. Quick freeze immediately.

## Icebox Recipe Keeps Kitchen Cool

### Dessert Delight Needs No Cooking

WHETHER it's a canasta party on the porch or just a friendly gabfest, something to eat is in order. On hot summer days or evenings, you want something that can be made far in advance, so there's no last-minute fussing in the kitchen. Why not serve a refrigerator dessert such as this Icebox Pudding.

Made with layers of crunchy corn soya shreds and a pineapple-nut mixture, it's good eating for warm weather. There's no cooking involved, therefore the kitchen will be cool. This dessert is attractive when cut in squares and served with a topping of whipped cream and a mint-flavored cherry.

#### Corn Soya Icebox Pudding (6-8 servings)

One-half cup butter or fortified margarine, 1 cup sugar, 3 egg yolks, 1 cup crushed pineapple, well drained, 1/2 cup chopped English walnuts, 1 1/2 cups corn soya shreds, crushed; 1/2 cup whipping cream, 6 to 8 mint-flavored cherries.

Cream butter and sugar, add egg yolks and continue creaming until well blended. Add pineapple and nut meats. Arrange alternate layers of corn soya shreds and pineapple mixture in shallow pan, 6x10x2 inches, using cereal for bottom and top layers. Place in refrigerator for at least 4 hours for flavors to blend; serve immediately. Cut in squares and top each serving with whipped cream garnished with mint cherry, if desired.

Have you tried the new frozen lemonade? It tastes wonderful and banishes lemon squeezing. There's also frozen grape juice for summer coolers. Pungent as freshly-crushed blue grapes, it combines perfectly with other fruit juices.

### GOOD COMICS CAN BE FOUND FOR YOUNG READERS

Now that it seems "comics" are here to stay, efforts are being made to sort the good from the bad and even use materials presented in "comics" style for teaching.

Since most of us would find difficulty in sorting out good comics, Mrs. Lemah Backus, Michigan State College extension specialist, offers suggestions to help make wise selections for young readers.

Lettering should be large enough to be read easily with plenty of space between the lines. Paper should be white or light colored so that lettering and pictures stand out well for easy reading. Drawings should be clear cut and not crowded on a page. They should be interesting but not disturbing. Cover pictures should represent truthfully the stories contained in the publication.

Select comics which contain correct and authentic facts, authority portrayed with respect, and relationships between people set forth as human and understanding.

Those who have made a systematic study of comics say that some have made noticeable improvements in their publications and many new ones have been added. For example, amusing animal characters come to life in many of the stories, usually to the delight of young readers. There has been an increase in Western stories and some of them are rated as very good.
