Fishing License Sales Still Down From 1949

Sales of resident and annual non-resident fishing licenses for June increased over June of 1949 but not enough to bring fishing license sales for the first six months of the year up to the total sales for the comparative 1949 period, conservation department license reports show.

With the opening of the fishing season on lakes south of highway M-46 and the beginning of the vacation period, resident fishing license sales rose from the 29 percent lag reported through May to only 12 percent below 1949 at the end of June. License agents issued 245,061 resident fishing licenses to July 1. During the same period last year they sold 392,019.

More non-residents are buying annual licenses enabling them to fish all year rather than the temporary 10-day variety, records show. Combined sales of both types of non-resident licenses for the six-month period were 21,122, or 17 percent less than the 25,310 of 1949. Annual non-resident sales totaled 19,330, or 11 percent less than last year's 21,577, and temporary non-resident licenses dropped to 1,792, a decrease of 47 percent from the 3,433 for the same period in 1949.

Trout stamp sales reflect the general decrease with \$3,763 sold to July 1, a 15 percent drop from the 99,008 total for the corresponding 1949 months.

Re-ill minnow license sales were down 10 percent from 1,233 to 1,278, while wholesale minnow licenses issued gained two percent, from 135 to 138, over 1949.

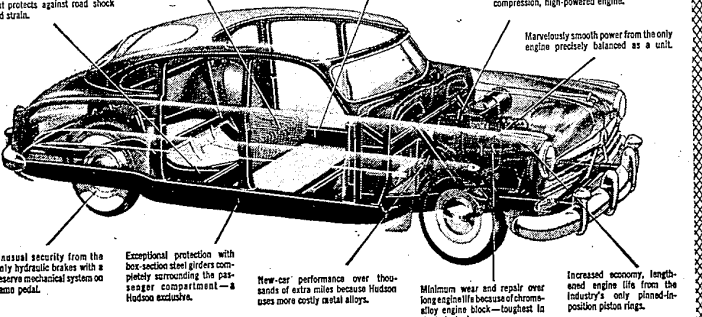
