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Oil Strike Brings Total For Year To Eight

The eighth Michigan oil strike this year, an estimated 100-barrel a day producer, has been made only a mile west of Mount Pleasant on the Albar farm, according to the conservation department's geological survey division.

The wildcat well is but 12 miles from the old Mt. Pleasant field and eight miles south of the Isabella field discovered last year.

Independent operators C. F. Collins and Frank Rand tapped the new well at 3,200 feet in section 20 of Union township. Earlier this year, Collins brought in a new gas well in the Traverse formation of Tuscola County.

State geologists report 14 discovery wells had been recorded last year up to this time. The 1934 total was 33 new oil and gas wells.



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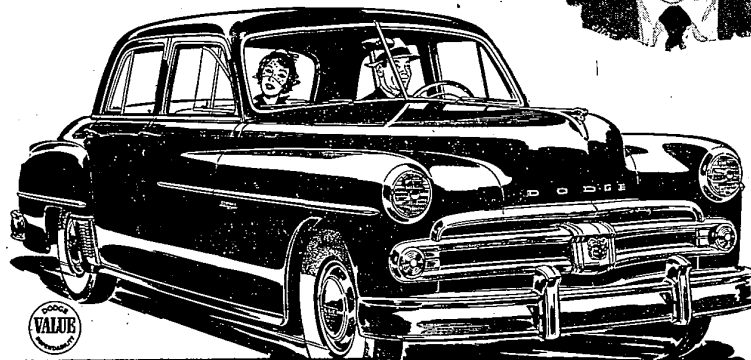
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
