Report Vandalism And Looting At Parks

Plenickers are not the only ones attracted to some state parks during the height of the summer season, the conservation department warns. Vandalism and thievery are reported at Dodge No. 4, Bay City, Muskegon and Island Lake.

"Park users who leave their cars unlocked are creating a tempting situation for young ruffians and making it just plain easy for organized looters," cautions A. C. Elmer, state parks chief.

Besides locking all doors, park managers ask violators to secure glove compartments and close windows. Valuables may be checked with the park concessionaire at these and other locations. For those who insist on leaving pocketbooks in automobiles, park men request that they not be left in sight on car seats.

Parking lots are being patrolled and several vandals have been caught and turned over to police.

Park Men Say Orchard Beach Park Overlooked

With hot weather now bringing top crowds of the season to the more well known state parks, the conservation department urges vacationing campers to try one of the lesser-used locations which have equal facilities.

State park men cite Orchard Beach park near Manistee as one of the spots regularly overlooked by tent and trailer campers although better equipped to take care of them than some of the other parks. Facilities attractive to campers also are available at Hoelt near Rogers City and Young near Boyne City — yet these locations too are overlooked or unknown to many.

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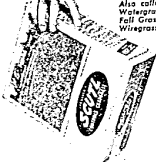
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
