County prosecuting attorneys of Michigan have formally urged repeal of the one man grand jury system. The plan was repealed by the state legislature in 1949 after 12 years' experience. A legislative committee is now studying the three-man law with a view of recommending changes in the next session.

A committee of the Michigan State Bar recommends appointment of supreme court and circuit court judges by the governor. The governor would be restricted in his selection to a list of candidates by a special judicial council of judges, lawyers and lay members. Salaries would be boosted; term of office lengthened; pensions provided for aged judges.

The University of Michigan, in cooperation with the Detroit News-WXYZ-TV, will undertake a broad-casting service of visual education this fall. The university maintains an extension division at the Rackham Center on North Woodward Avenue, Detroit.

Strengthening of public school administration through a grant of more than \$3,000,000 is announced by the Kelllogg Foundation of Battle Creek. The project is nation-wide and will be administered through leading universities and colleges. The foundation is financing the W. K. Kelllogg Center for Community Education - a million dollar hotel - at Michigan State College.

Pertinent to government bonds and was inflation: If American boys are sacrificing their lives in Korea, the least we can do at home is to sacrifice our dollars. Fall Best Time For Lawn Seeding

August 15 to September 1 is the best time of the year to seed lawns. The month of August is preferred to spring months because the small grass seedlings have much less competition from weeds at that time of the year. Spring is the time weeds grow most rapidly. By sowing the grass seed in August the grass gets established and is ahead of the weeds the following spring.

Everyone wants a nice green lawn, free of weeds and one which stays green all summer. As the latter part of August is the best time to seed the lawn, then it is time to start off on the right foot. First of all, level the lawn site. A level lawn adds more beauty than one full of holes. Secondly, have the soil tested to determine what fertilizer analysis is needed or if top soil is needed.

Thirdly, after the top soil has been added or after fertilizer has been worked in, there is the time to apply the seed. Kentucky Bluegrass is Michigan's most popular lawn grass and makes a fine looking lawn. One precaution in using Kentucky Bluegrass seed, it is slow to germinate, which means it takes approximately three to four weeks for it to come up. If seeded on a slope, 25% domestic type grass should be used to hold the soil somewhat until the Bluegrass comes up.

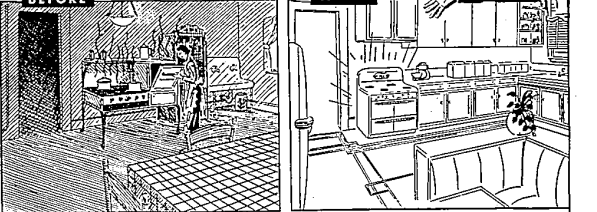
