City Tax Collection Has One Week To Go

There's going to be a rush of business at the City Treasurer's office next week — at least City Treasurer Mrs. Ralph Cotter hopes

City tax collections are only half complete, Mrs. Cotter says. Usually, 90% of the taxes are paid up before that last week before deadline. Starting September 1, there will be a delinquent penalty of two per cent. If they still aren't paid when November 1 comes around, then it'll be four per cent. And iff the taxes aren't in by the first of next March, then the bill will be turned over to the county for collection.


The 17 mill city tax will put 194,523.58, less delinquents, in the city's pocket. \$38,676.58 will come from taxes on real property assessed at \$2,913,785, and \$10,755.90 will come from personal property business tax, based on an assessment of \$532,700.
