Overhead, Not Guns, Big Defense Cost

Figures showing what the \$48.5 billion spent for the Military Establishment during the last four years means in terms of Federal taxes to various income groups have been released by the Council of State Chambers of Commerce. These show over the four years that three out of four families with an income of \$3,000 paid \$645.29.

A family of four with an income of \$5,000 paid \$1,130.08.
A family of four with an income of \$7,500 paid \$1,795.52.

In addition, these family groups paid out Federal taxes for other purposes connected with defense. These totaled a little less than \$1 billion and included such activities as arms aid to friendly nations, development of new materials and atomic energy projects. But they meant \$49.35 in Federal taxes to the \$3,000 group, \$87.26 to the \$5,000 group, and \$139.50 to the \$7,500 group.

The Council's study revealed that \$6.75 out of every \$10 spent for the Military Establishment went for pay of all personnel, and for food, clothing and supplies for the soldiers, sailors and marines. Less than \$2 of each \$10 spent for defense was used to buy guns, ships and planes.

The study declared that "Undoubtedly much housekeeping" diminished the value of the \$48.5 billion as an investment in preparedness, but efforts begun by Defense Secretary Forrestal and continued by Secretary Johnson to modernize the Establishment and cut out waste have now tended to strengthen that investment."

It added, "In view of the expanded program brought on by the Korean situation, it is all the more necessary that we obtain the maximum return for every dollar that we are investing in our national defense."

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SCHOOL DENTAL CLINICS TREAT OVER 700

Approximately 736 youngsters from the Farmington and Clarenceville area will have received complete fluoride dental treatments under the Cosmopolitan Foundation program by September 8, officials announced Monday.

The Farmington Dental Clinic, located at the Farmington High School, has completed 109 youngsters to date, according to Dr. William Edelson, clinic dentist. It is expected that another 136 youngsters now receiving treatment will be completed by September 8. Mrs. Edward Immon, school nurse, stated that 9 new appointments were cancelled Monday due to the illness of Dr. Edelson. Dr. Wheeler is taking Dr. Edelson's place temporarily. He is expected back at the clinic in a week.

A total of 331 youngsters have completed treatment at the Clarenceville Dental Clinic in a high school. Dr. Jack Smith, dentist in charge, stated that 60 more youngsters will be treated before the clinic closes September 8.

STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT CUTES TYPHOID CASES

Michigan has 256 known typhoid fever carriers, but all of them are under close supervision of the health departments of the state to assure that they do not give their illness to other Michigan residents, State Health Department reported.

The health department's diligent search for typhoid fever spreaders during the past 15 years has resulted in a total of 548 carriers in the state and has cut both the number of new cases and the number of deaths from typhoid fever in Michigan. A total of 424 cases of typhoid fever and 75 deaths from typhoid fever were reported in 1931. In 1949, 45 new cases of typhoid fever and one death from typhoid fever were reported in the state. Michigan has had no case of typhoid fever due to a public water supply in the past 16 years.

When it became known in 1932 that the main source of typhoid fever infections in Michigan were carriers, the health departments of the state undertook a systematic search to find the carriers and began a typhoid fever control program which emphasized carrier control, safety of public water supplies, complete pasteurization of milk supplies, proper sewage disposal and a close check of food handlers.

Under this program, known typhoid fever carriers are supervised throughout their lives to see that they do not handle food, water or dairy products intended for public consumption. They are visited by state or local health officers four times each year and are required to notify the health officer of any change in address. The identity of typhoid carriers is held confidential as long as the carrier cooperates with the health departments.

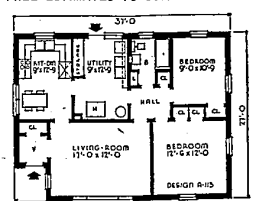
