It is plain sense and true community service. The Board is to be commended for their foresight and progressive action. The program is an example for all to follow who are interested in planning a progressive future.

The encouragement of individuals and organizations to take an active interest in their schools is of vital importance in itself. It can best be accomplished by inviting them to have a part in its future. This is undoubtedly the most important advantage of the program now adopted by the Board. Only by making each citizen a part of their schools, or their government, can we build and strengthen our society.

Another vital part of the Citizens' Committee idea is first hand information and the opportunity to idea is first hand information and the opportunity to suggest. Too often the people are on the outside looking in. They need encouragement to participate—encouragement that can come only from the govrnmental unit itself. Without this encouragement they soon loose interest and the breach between government and the people grows wider. This in itself is one of the most serious threats today to our American way of life. If the average citizen can suggest and take part in community action he has a feeling of belonging.

Citizen committees are constructive — they bring to the front the ideas of the people. Out of such a program comes a finished product that represents the majority thinking of the community. It minimizes a dissatisfaction and insures better understanding of the problems involved.

The fact that this type of democracy is growing in volume and importance all over the Nation is proof of its value. The Farmington community needs this progressive action to meet the problems of a growing area. has found its way into Congress and seems to be getting plenty of sympathy as well as kind treatment. The Congressmen have opened their hearts to those who are pushing for the restoration of two mail deliveries per day, in larger communities. The whole thing is a bit amusing to us country folks. We get along very nicely with one mail delivery a day and always have. Besides that we seem to be able to keep in touch with our city cousins pretty well.

Personally, we don't get the point of the shouting, particularly when we out this way can't even get a much needed post office so we can properly handle our one delivery. Unfortunately, this situation is true in a great many communities out this way. Apparently we don't know how to find our way into Congress, let alone finding the way to their hearts. We have gotten sympathy but the treatment — that must come later. The Farmington Post Office is now serving over 18,000 people on 8 routes, plus 2 city carrier routes. It is trying to do it with facilities completely inadequate. Farmington, like any other community, wants and urgently needs proper post office facilities. And we aren't asking for two deliveries a day — just one. Farmington has mail trouble too — and has had it for sometime. We appreciate the sympathy, but when you're sick it's the treatment that counts.
