STATE GETS \$100,000
IN FEDERAL FUNDS
FROM NEW LAW

Michigan should receive close to
\$100,000 in the 1951-52 fiscal period
and from \$175,000 to \$200,000 in
successing fiscal years for improv-
ing fishing in the state as the re-
sult of the federal Dingell bill be-
coming law.

Conservation department fishery
officials have not yet outlined pos-
sible projects for which the new law
funds might be used. The new law
states that the money can be used
for fishery research, lake and
stream improvement, and any other
purposes that will benefit sport-
fishing.

To get the fishery improvement
program started as quickly as pos-
sible, the first appropriation to the
states will be made from an anti-
ipated two million dollar appropria-
tion. Thereafter, it is expected the
states will share a larger part of
the revenue derived from the excise
tax. Not more than eight per cent
of each annual appropriation is to
be spent on federal expenses of in-
vestigation, administration and exe-
cution of the act.

Gives Tips On
Canning Tomatoes

With tomato season upon us, a
review of modern methods of pre-
serving that nutritious garden pro-
duce is offered by Roberta Hersey,
extension specialist in foods and
nutrition at Michigan State College.
You may use either the hot or
cold pack method for canning to-
matoes. The hot pack method, of
course, makes it possible to get
more tomatoes in the jar. Use
only perfect, ripe tomatoes. To
loosen the skins, dip into boiling
water for about one-half minute,
then dip quickly into cold water.
Cut out stem ends and peel to-
matoes.

For the hot pack method, quarter
the peeled tomatoes. Bring them
to a boil, stirring often. Pack bot-
tom of jar with glass jars to one-half inch of
the top. Add one-half teaspoon salt
to pints or one teaspoon to quarts.
Adjust jar lids and process in a
boiling water bath at 212 degrees
Fahrenheit. Either pints or quarts
should be processed 10 minutes. As
soon as you remove jars from the
canner, complete seals if closures
are not of the self-sealing type.

For the cold pack method, leave
tomatoes whole, or cut in halves or
quarters. Pack tomatoes to one-

half inch of the top of the jar
pressing gently to fill the spaces.
Add no water. Add one-half tea-
spoon salt to pints, and one tea-
spoon to quarts. Adjust lids and
process in a boiling water bath.
Process pint jars for 15 minutes
and quarts for 45 minutes. Com-
plete seals if necessary.

You can make your own tomato
juice very easily. Prepare tomatoes
as for canning and cut in pieces.
Simmer until they are softened,
stirring often. Put through a strain-
er and add one teaspoon salt to
each quart of juice. Other season-
ing may be added. Reheat at once
just to boiling.

Pack the boiling hot juice to one-
fourth inch of the top of the glass
jars. Adjust jar lids and process
in a boiling water bath. Process
either pints or quarts for 15 min-
utes.

Try moistening bananas with
lemon juice and roll in chopped
nuts or peanut butter - it's de-
licious and healthful.
