

## Watch Out For Kids!

"Don't let school bells sound the death knell for YOUR child."

This grim warning is issued by Sheriff Hubbard, spokesman for the State Safety Commission's September program of traffic safety education, as millions of youngsters troop to classrooms throughout the country — many for the first time.

For the beginner, Sheriff Hubbard said, "this may be the first tussle with the law, but the child on the street and the problems he must face for himself without Mother's personal guidance." For that reason, the danger to the very young is extreme at this time of the year.

This emphasis on child safety — the necessity for thorough safety education by both educators and parents and the driver's responsibility for child safety is part of the state-wide traffic safety program this month.

Another important part of the program, Sheriff Hubbard said, will be devoted to acquainting the public with the record of young drivers as a group, and how this record can be improved.

Traffic safety, education, Sheriff

Hubbard said, is not a thing we can arbitrarily end with the students, fourth, eighth, or twelfth year of formal education. Adult society, as it matures, drivers themselves have much to learn about traffic safety, so the process is obviously a never-ending one. Instruction early in a child's life, however, will do much to make things safer for him now and for all of us when he starts driving in 10 or 20 years.




