

Watch Out For Kids!

"Don't let school bells sound the death knell for YOUR child."

This warning is issued by Sheriff Hubbell, spokesman for the State Safety Commission's September program of traffic safety education, as millions of youngsters troop to classrooms throughout the country — many for the first time. For the beginner, Sheriff Hubbell said, "this may be his first tussle with reality — with the dangers of the street and the problems he must face for himself without Mother's personal guidance." For that reason, the danger to the very young is extreme at this time of the year.

This emphasis on child safety — the necessity for thorough safety education by both educators and parents and the driver's responsibility for child safety is part of the statewide traffic safety program this month.

Another important part of the program, Sheriff Hubbell said, will be devoted to acquainting the public with the record of your drivers as a group, and how this record can be improved.

Traffic safety education, Sheriff Hubbell said, is not a thing we can arbitrarily set with the students' fourth, eighth, or twelfth year of formal education. Adult — so-called mature — drivers themselves have much to learn about traffic safety, so the process is obviously a never-ending one. Instruction early in a child's life, however, will do much to make things safer for him now and for all of us when he starts driving in 10 or 20 years.

Using the slogan "WATCH OUT FOR KIDS", Sheriff Hubbell hopes to convince all adults that their teachings may mean the difference between life or death for some youngster, maybe your own.

Sheriff Hubbell asks that we regard a "School Zone" as a "Slow Zone" and also reminds us that the State law requires that we must stop for all school buses stopped on the highway.

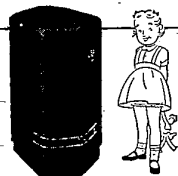
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WEST POINT PARK
