

### Mixers Bring New Service To Town



The Everett Implement Company's recent acquisition of two transit-mix concrete mixers, as well as installation of other facilities, means Farmington builders will have ready-mixed concrete readily available. Previously, sources of the building material were all located in downtown Detroit or Ann Arbor. The mixers, both of three cubic yard capacity, will go into service at once. Small equipment was selected to suit the needs of Farmington builders and home owners; more and larger equipment will be added as the need arises. The implement company will provide standard 4, 5, and 6 sack concrete mixes only, in quantities from one yard up.

### TRAFFIC CONTROL PETITIONS MAY GET ACTION

The petitions circulated by John Young of 22150 Middlebelt Road, asking for a spotlight at the Nine Mile - Middlebelt intersection, have been received and referred to County Forester Robert Gogsdon for action, Road Commissioner Robert O. Felt said Tuesday.

Gogsdon will consider the request and recommend any action to be taken, Felt said. The forester is also in charge of traffic control and planning.

Young also received this week a letter from J. Carl McMonagle, director of the planning and traffic division of the State Highway Department. The letter came in reply to Young's petition supported request for a traffic light at the Middlebelt - Grand River intersection.

In the letter, McMonagle stated that hazard at the intersection is reduced since motorists must cross only one lane at a time. "Accident reports indicate that although motorists cross the first direction of travel safely, they are getting into trouble attempting to pass through the second direction of travel. This is apparently caused by motorists making the appropriate stop the first time they approach the intersection and then attempting to proceed all the way through both slabs of pavement without another stop at signalized intersections which means that we could not reduce this type of accident by the installation of such a device," the letter said.

McMonagle added that District Traffic Engineer Borden is working on the intersection and "we are awaiting his recommendations for improvement in existing traffic control measures," and that "Grand River Avenue is also carrying a high volume of traffic which would be considerably restricted by the use of too many traffic signals in this area."

### Confiscated Firearms Net State \$1,031

The conservation department received 235 bids on 42 confiscated firearms which were sold for \$1,031. Except for one gun, all were disposed of at bids ranging from \$2.00 to \$65.00.

Funds derived from the annual sale of confiscated guns are used in game and fish work.
