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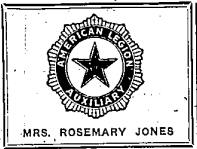

Spread By Air Mists

Danger From Biological Warfare Is In Spreading Of The Diseases

(This is the second of a series of six short articles prepared by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense, dealing with Biological Warfare.)

What are the dangers from biological warfare?

In spite of America's great health safety system, BW holds dangers that every citizen should be aware of, Civil Defense authorities state.

The danger is not from unknown or rare diseases attacking humans, animals or crops. The real danger is in new ways of spreading old diseases.

You can forget about new "mystery" germs or poisons, depicted by some fiction writers as so powerful that millions of people would die on one exposure. Civil Defense experts insist the real danger is from known diseases.

An enemy nation could spread disease germs through the air by floating them in the fine sprays or mists, technically called aerosols. Bathroom atomizers, DDT bombs and spray guns produce small-scale aerosols.

The aerosol method of spreading disease germs has never been tried in actual warfare, but it is possible. BW attacks could be based from enemy aircraft in air planes. If the enemy could succeed in making an attack close to the ground.

If a small bottle of laboratory-grown disease germs was spilled on a factory floor, the bugs would

Large Michigan Colleges Advance Up Size Ladder

Michigan's largest educational institutions — the University of Michigan, Michigan State College and Wayne University — all moved up the ladder in size among the nation's leading schools this year in spite of decreased enrollments.

This has been revealed in the annual report of Dr. Raymond Walters, president of the University of Cincinnati.

In terms of full-time enrollment, the University of Michigan is fourth in the U. S. with an enrollment of 17,035, and MSC is ninth with 12,210 full-time students. Last year U. of M. was seventh and Michigan State was tenth.

In total enrollment, including part-time students, U. of M. ranks eighth with 19,655; Wayne University is 14th with 17,384; and MSC is 20th with 13,537. Last year the University of Michigan, Wayne and Michigan State College ranked 8th, 15th and 18th, respectively.

The top ten American universities in full-time enrollment are: University of California, 34,883; Minnesota, 18,232; Illinois, 18,036; Michigan; New York University, 16,858; Ohio State, 16,583; Wisconsin, 16,142; Columbia, 13,949; N. S. C.; and Indiana, 11,762.

Safe Crust of Ice Now Covers Most Lakes


Safe crust of ice now covers practically all inland fishing waters in the state, the conservation department reports.

Ice should be checked as a matter of routine caution, however, particularly on lakes with spring-fed streams and during thaw periods in any location.

The department reminds winter fishermen that ice shanties must be plainly identified on the outside with owner's name and address in two-inch or more insulable letters.

New fishing licenses were required commencing January 1.
