VALENTINE'S DAY STEMS FROM EARLY CHURCH SAINT

This day was originally set aside in the memory of St. Valentine, a bishop of the early church, who was put to death at Rome in the reign of Claudius on February 14, 270.

During the ancient Roman Feast celebrated in the memory of Juno, it was customary for the young men to draw tablets from an urn on which the names of young maidens were written. The young man was then supposed to devote himself to this maiden for a year. The Festival was held near the anniversary of St. Valentine's death, so this practice of choosing sweethearts became quite common on St. Valentine's Day.

There were several saints by the name of Valentine, one German authority stated there were fifty-two. One was especially liked by the German peasants for his charity and his care for the sick and needy. They often went to him for the relief of diseases.

The English peasantry had the opinion that the birds chose their mates on this day as was said by both Shakespeare and Chaucer.
